



Annual Flower Give-Away

Preparing....As always, this year's flower giveaway – held on May 14th – drew many Village owners and residents. The count: we gave away 476 flats of annuals and 100 flower box kits. That's a bunch of flowers!

So just how do these flats and kits appear, all ready for you to pick up on a Saturday? In mid-winter we choose the giveaway date in May and place the order, which is always reviewed by the Landscape Committee and our master gardener. What we order is based on the previous

year - which flowers were popular, which weren't, and how well the plantings seemed to do

around our grounds. For this year's event we decided to increase flowers destined for the flower box kits, which have proven to be quite popular.

Next, as do all gardeners and plant-lovers, we wait and wait and wait for spring. Eventually the time arrives: yea!

Next comes the hard work: very early on the day before the giveaway, our order is delivered by Pinter's in Belle-



ville, then around 8 or 9am, volunteers come in to help unload the truck, sort the flowers, and follow the master gardener's plan for assembling window box kits. As we've done for a few years, there are four options for the window box kits: two choices for sunny areas and two choices for shady areas. By noon or a bit later, the work is done, and everyone goes home.



Most of the staff members, landscape crew, and volunteers come back

the next day to help out at the actual giveaway event!



I made a plan to feed my planters this year using only organic fertilizer. I normally use the blue stuff mixed in water, but I purchased Seaweed and Fish Emulsion this time. Although it was more expensive, I still want to experiment with organic this year and see if it performs as well as synthetic. Warning: the fish and seaweed concoction scent is quite pungent! I applied it one Friday morning in the pool planters and in my personal planters at home. It smelled like fish all weekend around my house! I wondered if people were lying around the pool wondering who threw out a dead fish in the garbage! I must exclaim, however, that the results from the stinky stuff were outstanding. The plants took off after only one feeding, sending out beautiful healthy green foliage and a myriad of blooms.

LISA'S PLANT OF THE MONTH: ARALIA CORDATA 'SUN KING'- Golden Japanese Spikenard; 3x3'

This bold, eye-catching beauty brightens a partially shaded spot in the garden. The brilliant yellow foliage stays clean and fresh all season with no insect or disease problems. The branches are a pretty reddish brown. In late summer, Aralia blooms with white flowers that attract honey bees. Dark purple black berries follow the flowers, adding winter interest. Aralia 'Sun King' will tolerate heavy shade, but the foliage coloration will be more greenish chartreuse than bright yellow. I've utilized this stalwart charmer in gardens that are regularly visited by deer, and I can tell you with conviction that it is definitely deer-resistant as well! A plant with this many accolades is a must-have for gardeners.



JULY GARDEN CHORES: July in the garden is laborious but offers many benefits as well. Finally, a tomato appears! And the Zinnias and Dahlias take center stage and ramp up their show. When the



garden looks a bit tired and scraggly, this is when you are glad that in early June you added these mid to late summer stunners. They are well worth the wait! July is the month to stay vigilant about pulling weeds and hand-picking pest insects. It is the time to stake the floppy plants lying about on the ground or leaning on their neighbors. Lay down plastic sheeting on that area of the garden that is always overrun with weeds. The sun will cook them to death. Gardens need an inch of water a week. If Mother Nature hasn't provided rain, water your plants deeply in the root zone. Don't give a sprinkle of water here and there. It's best to deeply water less often. Containers need to be watered every day and provided with a periodic feeding. July is the month when the dreaded Japanese Beetles arrive in droves. Manage these voracious pests by hand picking in the morning and evening and dropping them into a bucket of soapy water.

The July garden chores seem endless, but don't throw in the towel. Let's trudge through the unpleasantness and arrive in August with a tidy garden that is ready for the late summer plants to make their presence known.
