# **INTO THE GARDEN- April 2020**

"Behold, my friends, the spring is come; the earth has gladly received the embraces of the sun, and we shall soon see the results of their love! " - Sitting Bull

2020 has so far been challenging, a very unusual time. When we are finally set free from this shelter-in-place, when our world is once again safe to enter, we shall proceed into the gardens, completing one chore at a time, doing the best that we can do to catch up. This year will be different than others, and patience will be needed and appreciated to get through this together. The gardening staff and I will hit the ground running as soon as possible, and we will make the community just as lovely as always. I know you will too. For now let's get our minds on something else...plants!

#### LISA'S TRIED-AND-TRUE ANNUALS

Here is a formula often used for planter design:

- There must be a thriller, or tall middle plant, some fillers that will wave in and out and fill in the planter, and some spillers, plants that cascade down the side and soften the look of the pot. These three components together make for aesthetically pleasing planters.
- Pay attention also to the One Third Rule, which means that your planter should be one third of the height of the tallest plant in the pot.

#### **THRILLERS OR MIDDLES:**

For A Sunny Site-

- DAHLIA- plants that grow to a mature height of between 2-3' are best; my faves are peach, pink, purple, and especially orange in color. (email me if you want names)
- \* SALVIA CATHEDRAL PURPLE (18"), EVOLUTION (24") and PLAYIN' THE BLUES (48")- cobalt blue



Meadow Sage; Cathedral Purple is violet. This plant blooms consistently and draws in the pollinators. Plus it combines beautifully with many different colors.

\* DRACAENA- a tall spiky plant for foliar interest. I like to cut off the lowest couple of rows of leaves so that I have more space to plant other annuals. Dracaena comes in varieties with differing leaf colorations such as green with red stripes and burgundy.

#### For Shady Site-

- \* COLEUS some varieties reach a height of 42". This is another plant for foliar interest and has a large range of leaf colors and shapes. The flowers aren't particularly pretty, but the beneficial insects love the tiny blossoms.
- \* BEGONIA DRAGON WING- a robust powerhouse, with gorgeous shiny dark green leaves and persistant bright pink or brilliant red flowers. I've never had a bad experience with this plant!
- \* FUCHSIA GARTENMEISTER BONSTEDT- my favorite annual for shady spots! The long tubular flowers are reddish-orange, a color that stands out beautifully against the dark wine green foliage. The clusters of low-hanging flowers come one after the other, making the humming birds very happy campers!

#### FILLERS:

Sunny-

\* LANTANA SUNSHINE ROSE, BANANARAMA, BERRY BLEND- all Lantana plants are bloom factories, en-



ticing pollinators and hummingbirds with their never-ending blossoms. I do have to warn you, however, that the dead-heading can be tedious but

is necessary. Allowing the plant to set seed will slow down the production of new blossoms.

- \* PHLOX INTENSIA LAVENDER GLOW OR CABERNETif you've never tried this plant, you will be amazed and hooked when you do! Add a couple of these to your planter, add water weekly, and fertilize with a water-soluble fertilizer every 4 weeks. You will be rewarded with constant blooms all summer long.
- \* PLECTRANTHUS CERVEZA 'N LIME- a stalwart, drought-tolerant foliar annual for full sun. The thick leaves are variegated with green and bright yellow. Plectranthus grows upward for height, but it will also grow outward, serving as a filler plant as well. I love using this one in a planter with blue Salvia.

# DIY CLEANING SOLUTION

Some people have appreciated this suggestion for a traditional home-made recipe, with the timing of disinfection based on common infection control policy for killing resistant pathogens within the UofM Hospitals systems.

So I thought I would forward it for consideration for use in homes, in place of unavailable commercial disinfection wipes.

- 1 Tablespoon Bleach
- 2 Cups Water
- Place in a spray bottle.
- Spray on commonly used surfaces; keep wet for one minute; then either allow to air dry, or wipe dry with a gloved hand.

#### IN THE GARDEN, CONTINUED...

#### Shady-

- \* IMPATIENS ROCKAPULCO AND BOUNCE SERIES- I love their size, the leaves stay clean and dark green all season, and the flowers are numerous and reliable. What more can I say?
- \* HYPOESTES- another foliage plant for shade, also known as Polka-dot Plant. My favorite of course is the rose color (gorgeous with burgundy or lime green Coleus), but the white is pretty also, and will brighten up a dark corner. Plant the white variety in front of a wine-colored Coleus to really make it pop.
- \* TORENIA SUMMER WAVE LARGE AMETHYST and VIOLET- also known as Wishbone Flower, this one blooms all season with large blossoms that draw in



hummers and bees. Torenia prefers filtered to full shade and is deer-resistant. It can be used as a spiller as well, but I prefer to plant it back from the edge so that it will weave through the other plants.

#### **SPILLERS OR TRAILERS:**

Sunny-

- \* SUPERTUNIA PETUNIA- Supertunias are petunias on steroids. The blooms and plants are more rugged and vigorous. My faves are Royal Magenta, Sangria Charm, Mini Rose-Veined, Vista Fuchsia and Vista Bubblegum. Oh and Raspberry Blast!
- \* SUPERBENA VERBENA- again the "super" indicates an improved variety, one that blooms profusely, stays disease-free, and is more robust. My faves are Coral Red, Pink Shades, Royale Chambray, Royale Plum Wine, and Royale Peachy Keen (so luscious with Supertunia Raspberry Blast).
- \* SUPERCAL PETCHOA NEON ROSE- I found this Petunia and Calibrachoa (Million Bells) hybrid a couple of years ago at Lowe's of all places. I was blown away by its season-long stellar performance. The large blossoms were a gorgeous bright rosy pink, the plants bloomed continuously and were never attacked by aphids!

#### Shady-

\* TRAILING COLEUS- varieties such as Chocolate Drop, Strawberry Drop, and Garnet Robe trail over the edge of the planter instead of growing upright. The foliar colorations are gorgeous and combine well with many colors.

- \* DICHONDRA SILVER FALLS- a powerhouse spiller shade plant. I love this plant with its silver foliage and strong trailing habit. Stunning with violet-blue, wine, and shades of pink.
- \* SWEET CAROLINE LIGHT GREEN SWEET POTATO VINE- this vine is better in dappled shade rather than deep shade. The Sweet Caroline variety grows upward a bit and trails down over the edge of the planter. The chartreuse color is eye-catching with magenta, purple, pinks, and wine. I prune this back periodically throughout the summer when it gets a little too pushy in the planter.

# OUTSTANDING PERENNIALS I MUST RECOMMEND! FULL SUN:

\* STACHYS 'HUMMELO' (sta-cheese HUMmelo)-Common name- Betony; Mature Size- 24 x 24"-This dependable workhorse was crowned the 2019

Perennial Plant of the year!It was love at first sight when I first spotted this perennial in bloom. The upright spikes of rosy lavender flowers appear all through summer. The wrinkled, scallop-



edged dark green leaves remain attractive all season. And the pollinators! They just love it! It is known as a bee magnet.

#### MADE IN THE SHADE:

\* EPIMEDIUM GRANDIFLORUM 'LILAFEE'- Several common names- Bishop's Hat, Barrenwort, Fairy Wings; Mature Size is 18 x 18"- The unusual blooms on this variety are an eye-catching violet lavender and appear in May before the new foliage opens. I have Jonquil Daffodils planted behind



mine. They bloom together and it is fabulous! Epimediums prefer dappled to full shade and will burn in full sun. This plant is droughttolerant, making it perfect for under trees. Plants may

slowly creep, in a good way, if the site is ideal.

I hope to see you around the community soon! For now, get out and play... at least 6 feet away from each other.
