Christmas tree free drop-off sites

While Christmas trees cannot be discarded on the street or be left out on extensions, the City of Ann Arbor instead provides four free drop-off locations for undecorated Christmas trees through Monday, Jan. 18, 2021.

The four park locations will be open for Christmas tree drop offs during normal park hours, 6 a.m.–10 p.m. The collected trees will be chipped on a regular basis at the park sites.

The drop-off locations are:


- 1. Southeast Area Park located on Ellsworth at Platt. Trees may be left at the dirt lot north of the basketball courts.
- 2. West Park parking lot off Chapin near West Huron Street.
- 3. Gallup Boat Launch parking lot (not the Gallup Livery), entrance on the southeast side of Geddes Road, East of Huron Parkway.
- 4. Olson Park parking lot, 1515 Dhu Varren Road, near Pontiac Trail.

IN THE GARDEN

Welcome January 2021! As you hibernate or stay home to stay well, I have another fun project. I have been making the most fabulous salt scrub and putting the mixture into cute little jars to gift to loved ones. The recipe is easy, and the scents of the essential oils cozy up my whole house. My Relax Blend is incredibly soothing. The best jars to use for storing the scrub are shallow with a wide mouth so that it's easy to dip your hand in to scoop out the salt scrub.

RECIPE:

1 cup Epsom Salt

1/4 cup coconut oil

1 squirt of almond oil (optional)

Add essential oil to scent as desired. My Relax Blend contains Clary Sage, Bergamot, Sandalwood, and Lavender. A less expensive alternative is to buy an Essential Oil Blend already mixed in one bottle. These are available in various blends to suit your desired mood.

Store your salt scrub in a jar; keep aside for a few days before use to let the mixture meld together. Rinse your skin afterward with warm water. Apply a lotion if desired. I like to use an unscented lotion so that the essential oil scents linger on my skin. Note: For an out of this world exfoliating Foot Scrub, add 1/4 cup Sea Salt or Kosher Salt as well. This salt is chunkier and more abrasive for heels.



CHRISTMAS CACTUS

My Grandma Hazel always had the most beautiful Christmas Cactus growing and blooming in the room they dubbed the library of their home. The windows faced east. Gram was one of those people who didn't fuss over her plants, but they flourished anyway. An accidental gardener. A true green thumb.


One of my clients moved and gave me a Christmas Cactus she couldn't take along. Last year I was gone for most of the winter, and this neglected plant thrived and bloomed beautifully. This year I'm home and have been coddling this thing, but now the foliage is purplish, wrinkled, and droopy. It hates me! I consulted Google for advice and found out that Christmas Cactus prefers to be ignored. I found these tips as well:

~Christmas Cactus originates in the jungle so it prefers bright indirect light, not full sun. I had moved mine from the east window where it was holding its own to the sunny kitchen window. My first mistake. Reddish or purplish foliage is an indicator that the sunlight is too harsh. ~Check weekly for water needs. The soil should dry out between waterings. Droopy foliage is a sign of overwatering. ~They like to be snug in their pots in a fast-draining cactus soil mix. When you do re-pot your plant, do so in the spring when the days are starting to get longer. ~Christmas Cactus prefers temperatures between 60 and 70 degrees, and they'd like some humidity. I have placed some pea pebbles in the saucer, and I add water as needed to create humidity. If you try this, do make sure that the pot sits above the water to avoid root rot and use a nonporous saucer. ~Fertilize in March through mid August with a water-soluble cactus fertilizer according to the package directions. ~Prune your plant back yearly by cutting between two leaf segments. This will trigger your plant to branch out better. When a Christmas Cactus does bloom, the flowers are so bright and colorful and cheerful. One man on a gardening show called them, "living baubles". A perfectly fitting description.



INVASIVE WEED ALERT!

This news is not good. There has been a siting of an invasive vine from Asia called MILE-A-MINUTE near Albion College just west of Jackson. This annual weed vine grows a whopping 6 inches a day. The vines have triangular-shaped leaves, menacing barbs, white flowers in spring on stems with little round leaves, followed in July by purple berries. On top of its impressive growth rate, Mile-A-Minute vine also has the advantage of



are buoyant in water and can float down the river, establishing colonies near and far.

ONE ADVANTAGE THAT WE HAVE IF IT INVADES OUR SPACE:

It is shallow-rooted and is easily pulled from the soil. Wear puncture-resistant gloves when doing this to avoid being pricked by the fierce barbs, and if possible, pluck it out before the fruits ripen.

MY NEW YEAR RESOLUTION: get happy again. Did you make one for yourself this year?
