

THE TREE WORKING GROUP ~~UPDATE~~

After a slow start, the tree working group has blasted off, and our merry band of tree geeks has been busy in your backyards collecting data on our trees (Species/Height/Diameter/Condition, etc).

As of August, we have inventoried 86 trees. Kyler Melmoth, one of our star tree surveyors and expert conservationist, has access to "i-Tree" software to analyze our trees. "i-Tree" is a peer-reviewed software package from the US Forest Service that gives us incredible information about our trees. With the 86 trees that we have surveyed so far, we can report the following:

- ◆ Together they combine to reduce stormwater surface runoff by 28,500 gallons annually.
- They create a tree canopy that covers 2.3 acres. This canopy, and the shade it provides, is critical for combating global warming and the heat island effect.
- They produce 3.1 tons of oxygen per year.
- They remove 144 pounds of pollution per year.
- They sequester 1.1 tons of carbon per year.

Please note that this is based on the 86 trees for which we have collected data to date. This number of trees represents a survey of three partial blocks of the village. Therefore, these numbers should be much higher by the time we finish, highlighting the importance of our urban forest.

I would like to recognize our exceptional team of tree surveyors. Our survey crew leaders are Kyler Melmoth, Theresa Moore, and me. Two incredible crew members who have joined us regularly are Susanne Giraud and Linda Skolarus. We have also received much-needed assistance from Jan Frank and Rita Laurance. Board Beat: September 2025

Most of the Board meeting held Wednesday, August 27, was given over to presentations by managers of the Village infrastructure improvements project and a representative from the City's A2 Zero initiative. Highlights from each follow below.

As to regular Board business, the meeting agenda contained just three items:

- Snow Removal. Our annual agreement with the City permitting us to clear our own streets this winter in place of the municipal trucks, notorious for plowing cars in, has been signed, sealed, and delivered! In the past getting this agreement in place has often been a sticking point, but not this year. Margolis will do the work for us, on our streets and on our walkways.
- Water Service Lines. Up until now any remaining galvanized service pipes between mains and buildings have been replaced at City expense. Not so those for one last location: the courtyard homes at mid-block on the east side of Pittsfield Boulevard between Norwood and Oakwood. Service to eight units there is still provided by galvanized lines that because of the distances to the water main become ours to replace at our own expense. A pretty big expense: the contract we approved with Hutzel totals just under \$60,000.
- **Foundation Wall Stabilization.** Yet another of these pricey jobs will be undertaken by Home Spec at a unit on Fernwood. The cost: \$28,500.

A2 Zero/DTE Energy Efficiency Funding Opportunity

There is a possibility that our condo association may qualify for community-wide energy-efficiency upgrades under a combined program to be administered by DTE and the City's Office of Sustainability and Innovation (OSI). Steve Christiansen of OSI came to us and explained how this might work.

DTE administers a wide range of state-mandated energy efficiency programs to reduce its customers' use of gas and electricity. Among these is an income-qualified rebate program for multi-family communities. The program is funded by the Energy Waste Reduction (EWR) fees included in each customer's monthly bill. Ann Arbor also provides rebates for energy efficiency measures in multi-family communities; these rebates are funded by the City's Climate Action Millage. The two programs overlap in many areas, and to maximize their impact, OSI recently collaborated with DTE on a pilot program at another Ann Arbor multi-family community. Our small group of Village residents who volunteer as community liaisons to OSI on Sustainability matters have been discussing with OSI staff the possibility of establishing a similar rebate program here.

To maximize the potential benefit for our community we would need to meet DTE's income qualification threshold: 51% or more of our residents at or below 80% of Area Median Income levels. As examples, in 2024, the latest year for which levels have been calculated, this would mean a yearly income of no more than \$66,950 for a single-person household and no more than \$95,600 for a 4-person household. If that threshold is met, then all community members, regardless of their income, would be eligible for program rebates.

In the pilot program, DTE provided rebates for weatherization efforts such as air sealing and added insulation, all of which overlapped with qualifying uses under the City's rebate program. Combining financial forces, DTE paid 80% of the costs, and OSI covered the remaining 20%. For our community, if we were to meet DTE's income qualifications, the efficiency measures covered might mirror those of the other Ann Arbor community or they might differ, depending upon an assessment of our own particular needs. Each sponsoring agency covers a list of eligible projects, many of which are the same and many of which are not.

To move the process forward, the Board voted to officially communicate our interest in cooperating with OSI to explore the establishment of a community-wide income-qualified program in collaboration with DTE. The next step will be to determine whether our membership does indeed meet the required income threshold set by DTE. OSI and our Association will have to work out with DTE how the necessary income information should be gathered. There are time constraints as DTE is already more than half booked for 2026 projects. While both DTE and OSI still have funding available for 2026, we will need to act quickly or all of that money may be claimed by others. We hope to start gathering the needed data in October, so stay tuned!

Infrastructure Improvements Update

Project Managers for the Pittsfield Village infrastructure improvements work came before the Board again to provide a progress update.

• Whitewood Is Substantially Complete

- o New water mains have been installed.
- o Sidewalks have been added where there were gaps.
- o Curbs have been replaced as necessary.
- o New Paving is complete.

• Norwood Is Substantially Complete

- o New water mains have been installed.
- o New sanitary sewer line has been installed.
- o Curbs have been replaced as necessary.
- o New Paving is complete.
- o Lawn and Foundation Beds Restoration is in process.

Oakwood Is Nearing Completion

- o Storm sewer upgrades are complete.
- o Repaying should be completed by September 15.
- Pittsfield Work From Packard to Oakwood Has Begun: Water, Storm Sewers, and Pavement
- Storm Sewers and Detention Basin Bordered by Packard, Pittsfield, Norwood, and Whitewood
 - o Pending final signoff on an easement with the City.
 - o Slated for completion this fall.


